### **MICOM TO CHANGE FREQUENCY**

Several weeks ago someone mentioned rumors of MICOM changing frequency. MICOM is the medical dispatch unit, a consortium of hospitals, here in the Norther NJ area. Currently MICOM uses 155.175 with 100 hz PL. At this time it looks like MICOM will switch to **155.385**, using a PL of 100.0 hz. The new system will allegedly be a repeater so listening will be much more consistent. So when will this all happen? - Our sources tell us not for several months. The delay attributed primarily to licensing all the hospitals that will use the system.

Why the change - well for starters, standardization. The present system described above is not used by all towns so efficient communications isn't always possible. During hurricane Floyd many towns lost power and the fragmented system now in use caused many problems. To address these deficiencies "dispatch" used Carlstadt's transmitter. And despite the hastily prepared system it performed quite well. Adding to the need for change, band openings often allow similar organizations such as MONOC (Monmouth Ocean Hospital Service Corporation <South Jersey>) come roaring in from as far south as Atlantic City. Interestingly enough, the AC units use some of the same 2-tone sequential tones, often setting off pagers. Most of the garbage isn't heard, but it does raise the background level of noise and can desense the remote receivers to the point where it's hard for field Paramedics to get into the system.

## NNJ SCAN LIST

The nnj-scan list is available either as direct mailing (meaning that any time a mailing gets sent out to the list you get it immediately or in a "digest" form. The Digest contains either all messages from the previous day or, if there's sufficient traffic, up to some number (I think it might be something like 20K worth of text) of messages grouped together. (NNJ-Scan has never hit that limit). If you're subscribed to the list with the regular email, you'll get the message with the subject they were sent with, otherwise you'll get a message entitled "Digest nnn", where "nnn" is the number of the digest, numbered sequentially from the first digest issues. We're up close to 200 now, hence the "Digest 194"

heading you got.

I'm not sure why you got a blank digest, though I did see one message where someone had apparently replied to the digest version of the list with "unsubscribe", which, incidentally, doesn't work, you might have seen that.

They plan on updating the low-band fire radio before anything else. Rockland County does license several 460-470 MHz frequencies for use as a Vehiclur Repeater for the Fire Chiefs of the county to use.
